D.M.A. IN KEYBOARD PERFORMANCE

Overview

Students may pursue the Doctor of Musical Arts (D.M.A.) degree in Keyboard Performance (https://piano.frost.miami.edu/degrees/doctor%20of%20musical%20arts/dma-in-keyboard-performance/). The program is highly selective and competitive, and qualified applicants are eligible to receive graduate awards, such as scholarships or Graduate Teaching Assistantships. Through these opportunities, candidates demonstrate leadership as performers and teachers.

Within this degree program, three recitals of broad keyboard repertoire performed at the highest level of technical mastery and artistic expression are required during the three-year residency. Each candidate must also complete a final doctoral project, choosing from a doctoral essay, lecture recital, capstone fourth recital, or recording project.

The competitive reality of the market for performers has never been more demanding. We are proud that many of our students have gone on to win awards at piano competitions, have been invited to publish in recognized periodicals, and are currently in teaching positions both in the U.S. and abroad.
